

One Community Under God—MARK YOUR CALENDAR!!!



You may name Christ Church Parish Endowment as the Beneficiary of a Life Insurance Policy

As we know and discussed in the last Endowment Newsletter, the primary purpose of life insurance is to provide a safety net for those who depend on you financially. A life insurance policy can also allow you to leave a legacy—not just for the people you love but also for organizations like Christ Church Parish Endowment that are important to you.

To name a charity or non-profit organization the beneficiary of a life insurance policy just as you can name people beneficiaries. Because you can name multiple beneficiaries, you can divide the death benefit among your loved ones and a charity. The percentage of the payout the charity gets is up to you.

If you have an existing policy, changing the beneficiary to a charity is easy. You'll likely need to provide the organization's Tax ID number. Also, let the charity know it is a beneficiary so it will know to contact the insurance company to collect its payout when you die.

If you're applying for a new policy and want to name a non-profit the beneficiary, the process can be a little more complicated. There may be an "insurable interest" question, which asks the applicant to justify the financial loss the beneficiary would have if the insured died. When applying for a policy, inquire as to any restrictions on naming a beneficiary. Not all companies have restrictions.

Here are the advantages to consider.

Pro for the owner: You still own the policy. This gives you access to any <u>cash</u> <u>value</u> accumulation while living and the option to change the beneficiary. Pro for the charity: The charity receives a lump sum payment from the death benefit. Funding Stewardship Pledges using 2024 Retirement Account (RMD) Required Minimum Distributions

For the tax year 2024, IRA account holders aged 70 1/2 and older can make IRA-Qualified Distributions of up to \$105,000 (index adjusted annually) without owing income tax on the transaction, which can also count as your RMD for that year.

As of 2024, IRA account holders may give a one-time gift of up to \$53,000 directly to an eligible entity through a charitable gift annuity, charitable remainder unitrust, or charitable remainder annuity trust. This is an increase from \$50,000 in 2023.

A qualified charitable distribution can satisfy part or all of your IRA minimum distribution requirements. If you are planning to limit your distributions to the RMD amount, you will need to make sure part of that required minimum distribution is going directly to a qualified charity. This effectively lowers your taxable income by the qualified charitable distribution amount.

Christ Church Parish is not in the business of giving tax advice.


The Fellowship Committee will serve hot tea and cider immediately after our Christmas Eve service outside the doors of our church. Please join us!!!
